

- Persuade


...for the purpose of advancing public policy priorities

Former Speaker of the House James Wright (D-TX) said it best about why advocacy is necessary...


"If you are wondering whether or not to communicate your views..., consider that others who disagree with you are doing so constantly."



Why is Advocacy Necessary?


Former Senator Mike Enzi's (R-WY) response to the need to be involved was...

- You have more power than you realize
- Issues affecting the professions
- Opportunities for participation



You Have More Power Than You Realize

- According to the Congressional Management Foundation, in-person issue visits from constituents are the biggest influence on a member of Congress' decision-making.
- 97% of surveyed congressional staff believe constituent visits to DC have "some" or "a lot" of influence on an undecided member of Congress.
- 90% of congressional staff believe responding to constituent communications is a high priority to their office.
- ASHA is only as powerful as you make us.



Professional Participation

- Your participation is very important!
- Audiologists and SLPs spend much of their time being an advocate — not only for your clients but for yourself.
- Members are constantly impacted by decisions made by state and federal legislators.
- When members contact Congress and their state legislators, they provide them with vital information legislators need to make public policy decisions.




We did it!

ASLP-IC Next Steps

- Develop data system and get member states connected
 - Vendor expects to have viable product within 6 months of contract signing
 - ETA: Late 2024/early 2025
- Lobby Congress to pass SHARE Act to ensure Commission has access to background check determinations (TAKE ACTION at: https://www.votervoice.net/iframes/ASHAaction/Campaigns/101919/Respond)
- Assume responsibility for ongoing financial operation of the ASLP-IC (how fees will be structured and collected)

The Elevator Pitch

- Identify your role, could be in a group or you could be alone
- Clearly and succinctly state the main reasons why you are there; include any current legislation that you hope to influence
- Clearly state the greatest impact of the legislation
- **Show pictures if relevant**
 - Provide contact information for follow up
 - Send an email summary with contact information



ASHA Member Advocacy



Get to the point

- I am a speech-language pathologist. I am also the spouse of a Marine.
- I work with people who communicate differently and need services to develop communication skills.
- My career was negatively impacted by licensure laws that required costly fees and extended wait times to practice.
- The interstate licensure compact would have allowed me to practice without licensure barriers when we moved from state to state on military orders.
- Interstate compacts would improve healthcare access to Virginians and to military families needing continued care by increasing the number of SLPs and Audiologists licensed to provide services in Virginia.
- Voting yes for HB 2033 supports military families, speech-language pathologists, audiologists, and Virginians.





Finding time

- Many organizations have a "Take Action" link that saves time
- Create calendar reminder or sign up for email reminders
- Stick with just one organization to start
- Create one relationship with an elected official
